



CHILD PROTECTION WORKSHOP “Creating a Safe School”

About the Workshop:

Schools play a key role in the lives of children, and those who are working in schools are in a unique position to notice if something isn't right with a child. It is vital to be able to recognise physical signs and behavioural indicators that children may be living with abuse or neglect.

Everyone who has contact with children needs to know what to do if they are worried about a child, where to go to get help and have the confidence to take appropriate action to protect children.

This workshop focuses on creating a safe school environment by providing participants with the tools and knowledge to protect children in their care.
